Context and Background: The Maghull Hub One Stop Shop

Supporting the local community through the cost of living crisis and supporting the regeneration of Maghull Post Covid

Over the past 8 years Maghull Town Council has introduced a series of initiatives to support the local community. These initiatives ranged from establishing a pop up shop/business incubator, a community radio station, a series of media training events opportunities, and a local business forum. Other initiatives included a range of community events and festivals, firework displays, literary and Christmas events. The Town Council also owns and manages 15 parks and green spaces on behalf of local residents. We established a heritage group to develop and reflect the history and culture of the area, resulting in the first piece of major public art in Maghull, the partially completed Compassion in Conflict Statue, sited in Maghull North Railway Station and more recently we played a key role in having the rhinoceros installation, in Stafford Moreton Way, as part of our art in the community and greening strategy. All these initiatives were focused on developing social value/capital for our residents and businesses.

Like everywhere else, our community focused activities have suffered as a result of COVID and we are in the process of planning our post COVID recovery and regeneration strategy. We are planning to enhance the work we have done to date by developing a recovery/regeneration programme based on the principles and practice of Community Wealth Building(CWB) We have developed a Local Neighbourhood Plan which fits into this model. We are also facing an unprecedented cost of living crisis that will hit our community. Over 28% of our resident are over 65 and on fixed incomes and there is a high percentage of residents in relatively low paid employment, these groups will be hit hard by rises inflation and cost increases in essential items, such as food, energy and fuel.

We want to do more to help our residents during this difficult period so we are planning to bring together key local public and private sector organisations, legal, welfare, health and advice services to offer a range of free support services for our residents. These organisations will work out of the soon to be established Maghull Community Hub. Many of our residents are in danger of falling into a poverty trap created by the cost of living crisis, and many are unaware that they may be entitled to extra help as a right of citizenship.

Recently we had a women in her 80s enquiring about council tax rebates, as she and her housebound 90 year old husband were starting to struggle. She had no idea that she was entitled to claim attendance/carers allowance which would make the difference between them keeping their heads above water and stop them falling into poverty. There are probably many hundreds of residents across our area who are in a similar position.

Many people don't realise that they may be entitled to claim additional help. In the UK last year there was over £15 billion in unclaimed entitlements, you do not have to be unemployed, these are your entitlements as a citizen of the UK. Approximately 7 mullion people are not claiming monies they are entitled to. This income can help to keep people out of the poverty trap caused by the cost of living crisis. 500 people from Maghull and district accessed services from the CAB, (all telephone based) last year,including PIP, Universal Credit etc. Face to face

support is not available and this is part of the rational for the Hub, eg to provide support with the bureaucratic processes for getting what people are entitled to and dealing with energy companies. There is evidence of underclaiming entitlements that older people qualify for, which could make a huge difference as the cost of living crisis begin to bite.

Proposals for Town Council Meeting

- We agree to undertake a 3 year project to help residents with the forthcoming cost of living crisis
- We agree to sign the 3 year lease with Evolve for the HUB asap (inc half rent for 9 months)
- We explore the costs and benefits of establishing an arms length charity to operate the Hub
- We work in collaboration with the Vauxhall Law Centre (anchor) and Sefton CAB, and other appropriate specialist services, to deliver support services for residents of Maghull and District
- The town council will act as an independent arbitrator /provide triage services to refer residents onto the most appropriate service provider in our partnership
- We commit £23,000 from the £38,000 underspend to employ an administrator to manage the triage process
- We seek additional external funding to support the costs of the project
- We approach Aintree and Lydiate to make a financial contribution to the running costs (£5-£7 K each). Effectively meaning residents for the three areas, Maghull, Aintree and Lydiate can access the service
- We agree to prioritise the opening of the HUB asap so it is up and running prior to the energy cap being removed

At the moment there is no service in Maghull , the Town Council is in the position to step up and provide this service to our residents.

There is a need in Maghull and District for a one stop shop for the community and local business. The HUB could be the first step in establishing this. However the initial focus and energy must be targeted in helping residents through the cost of living crisis which could be a catastrophic event for some of our residents.

Linking community organisations
Business start up advice

We will work with local business to

Prevent leakages in the local circular flow of income(keeping the Maghull £ in Maghull). Examples include; working together on a town wide shop local campaign. Working together on local promotion campaigns. Developing inter-trading opportunities where possible/relevant. Supporting the development of local social enterprises. Coaching social

enterprise. Develop a local loyalty scheme.

2. Background

In 2019 the Council developed a business plan which set the goals for the work and projects the Council would like to complete in its 4 year term. Several of these projects were unable to be completed due to the Covid 19 outbreak and the business plan was revisited in 2021. A key part of the business plan was the plan to develop a Maghull Hub, based in the town centre which would be a "one stop shop" for services for Maghull residents.

During recent Council meetings the issue of the cost-of-living crisis has been raised. Members had requested that officers look at the possibility of bringing forward the Maghull Hub to aid Maghull residents with this issue. Further details can be found in the appendix at the back of the report.

3. Current Position

The project aims to support the following:

- Advice and support with issues arising with the cost of energy
- Debt advice and guidance
- Welfare advice and guidance (rights and entitlements)

- Housing issues
- Using technology for universal credit
- · Advice and guidance on health-related issues
- · Accessing additional support based on individual needs
- Maximising individual income

Enquiries have been made to Evolve Estates, (the owners of the Square), regarding the Management Suite (Tardis) situated behind Costa Coffee. They have offered the Council a lease for 3 years with a favourable lead in period until the project has had time to seek external funding to assist with the costs.

The Council has agreed to put £38,000 back into Earmarked Reserves following an underspend in the budget for 2021-22.

This money could be made available for the project should Council wish to do so. As the project would benefit the greater Maghull area Lydiate, melling and Aintree Village Parish Councils have been asked if they would like to contribute to the scheme. A proposed contribution of between £5,000-7,000 is requested. External funding of £10,000 has been applied for from the Awards For All lottery grant awarding scheme. However, there is a delay of approximately 12 weeks before a decision is known. This can be applied for each year and if successful, be used to offset costs. Other external funding would also be applied for as necessary.

The project aims to facilitate the provision of bespoke debt and welfare advice to residents of the town. This would be provided by core partners including the Vauxhall Law Centre and Citizens' Advice Bureau both of whom have agreed to participate in the project.

1. Background

The WW1 Panels project was a continuation of the public art project which led to the commissioning and placing of "Compassion in Conflict", the statue reflecting the horror of war and commemorating the work of Moss Side Hospital in its pioneering treatment of shell shock victims.

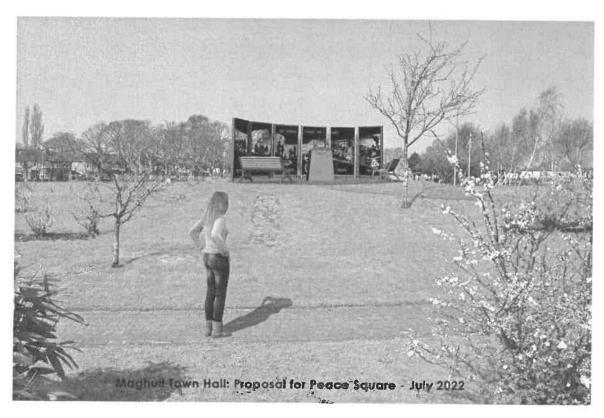
The Panels are a journey of the excitement of going to war, the horrors that were unleashed which led to shellshock and chronic mental health breakdowns and the slow journey to recovery. It was originally planned to place the panels next to Compassion in Conflict at Maghull North Railway Station but this has not proved possible.

Therefore, it is proposed to locate the panels on KGV Playing Fields on the mound nearest the community fruit garden. This would involve the mound being flattened and relandscaped. The panels would then be placed on the landscaped area, facing west (the setting of the sun) symbolising the last journey many soldiers took. It is also proposed to place the Truce statue, currently housed in the Council Chamber as part of the installation. The Council has successfully requested that McCarthy Stone donate the plaque and engraving which was the war memorial for the Royal British Legion building at Red Lion Bridge which can be included in the site. A further area, similar to the 5th plinth at Nelson's Column be created to encourage local artists and schools to have temporary installations there and build on the public art provided by the Council for the town and its residents.

The landscaping has been provisionally agreed with Persimmon for them to do the work to our plan as part of their community engagement.

Images have been provided by Castle Fine Arts to give an impression of the installation when it was completed.
